



Three SCCPSS high schools have earned designation as “No Place for Hate” schools for the 2022-23 School Year. New Hampstead High School was the first SCCPSS High School to earn this distinguished designation from the American Defamation League as a school committed to developing long-term solutions for creating and maintaining an inclusive, safe, and equitable climate.
